WELCOME AND INTRODUCTION

The meeting was convened at 10:00 a.m. After a brief introduction and welcome, Mr. Fortune began an overview of the project and the process involved.

OVERVIEW OF HAZARD MITIGATION AND EXPLANATION OF PLANNING EFFORT

Mr. Fortune went over a PowerPoint presentation outlining the project and the process (see ATTACHMENT #1). This project is being funded by a Pre-Disaster Mitigation (PDM) grant from FEMA. A non-federal match is required on the grant. The match is being covered by localities actively participating in the Plan through in-kind donations (staff time). All seven counties plus the Towns of Farmville and Crewe are actively participating.

The other towns will be covered on the Project Management Team through their respective counties during the process. They will still be expected to participate, but at a lower level. Their participation, at a minimum, will need to include having at least one mitigation strategy in the Plan and adopting the Plan (when it is ready) as it pertains to them.

The update will cover all of the localities within Planning District 14. Cumberland County did not participate in the most recent update, but will be participating in this one.

^{*} Denotes Project Management Team Member

As per federal requirements, the plan needs to be updated every five (5) years for the covered localities to remain eligible for certain types of FEMA funding. They include:

- The PDM Program now known as Building Resilient Infrastructure in Communities (BRIC);
- o The Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP); and
- o The Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA) Program

The handout included a tentative project schedule. Mr. Fortune said that the CRC hopes to have this project completed in 24 months.

<u>DISCUSSION OF WHAT WILL BE EXPECTED OF THE PROJECT MANAGEMENT TEAM, AND OVERVIEW OF PUBLIC MEETINGS</u>

Mr. Fortune went over what is expected of the Project Management Team. Members are being asked to assist with data collection and reviews. Additionally, Management Team members will also be asked to review materials and provide feedback. Members will also be expected to serve as liaisons for the respective localities. Mr. Fortune said the Project Management Team could expect to meet at least 4-5 times during the process.

To get full public participation, CRC staff will make the draft Plan available for public review and comment (when it is ready) and may make a public presentation at a monthly Council meeting during the process. In addition, CRC staff may make presentations at other public meetings as deemed necessary or appropriate.

Mr. Fortune asked the group for their preference on how to present draft materials for the Plan to the group for review. Thew consensus was to present the sections of the draft Plan as they are ready to review.





WELCOME AND INTRODUCTIONS, PRESENTATION BY CONSULTANT

Staff from Berkley Group gave a slide presentation on their planned methods to collect and update data for this plan update. Some of the items that were discussed include:

- Data-Based Approaches
 - o GIS and mapping, utilizing public-available data
 - Combining with other data (e.g., Forestland Conservation Value)
 - Blank spots public owned land
 - o Historical and Anecdotal Data
 - News sources, local input, pictures
- Cascading Threats

- Risk Assessment Matrix:
 - o Extent of hazard (distance)

 - Quantifying damage to agricultural products (e.g., timber and pulp)

 - o Incorporating elements of climate change within each hazard

INPUT FROM STAKEHOLDERS

The consultant conducted a virtual poll to assess the most and least concerning hazards in the various communities. Participants were asked to consider which hazards would impact the community with greater frequency and cause the most damage. The results:

- o MOST: Thunderstorm, Winter storm/Ice Events
 - Power outages
 - Limited response from medical and emergency services (e.g., length of time)
 - Property damage, loss of food
 - Cleanup efforts
 - Utility company time and costs
- o LEAST: Erosion, Radon, Dam/Levee Failure

Specific community-based concerns cited by attendees included:

- Farmville due to staff shortages, limited ability to sufficiently record data and assess hazards (particularly for emergency management sector)
 - o In addition, some areas have flooding issues near the Appomattox River
- **Buckingham County** near Georgia Creek, erosion protection to avoid flooding properties; man-made flooding?
- **Dillwyn** stormwater runoff
- Kenbridge runoff water flooding culvert, due to poor construction 40s and 50s
 - o Removing buildings from floodplain
 - E.g., old fire station where land subsidence occurs; also located near a creek behind the structure
- Amelia County; random power outages due to weather issues:
 - o SEC and Dominion
 - o Central VA Electric Buckingham County

WELCOME AND INTRODUCTION

The meeting was convened at 1:30 p.m. Mr. Fortune noted that the meeting was being recorded, and was open to the public. After a brief introduction and welcome, Mr. Fortune turned the meeting over to Mr. Zehner and his team from The Berkley Group for an overview of the HIRA revision process and the changes made from the prior updated of the hazard Mitigation Plan.

OVERVIEW OF HIRA REVISION PROCESS

Mr. Zehner and Mr. Luke Peters provided a PowerPoint presentation and discussed the process for reviewing the HIRA and the changes made from the prior (2018) Plan Update. The draft HIRA had been made available to the group a few days prior for them to review. The HIRA consisted of three sections: Hazard Identification (Section 4), Hazard Analysis (Section 5), and Vulnerability Assessment (Section 6). As part of the update process, the consultant assessed additional hazards that were not included in the previous plan update: Radon, Invasive Species, Infectious Diseases/Pandemics, and Climate Change.

Another change for this update was that instead of using HAZUS, the consultant used FEMA's National Risk Index (NRI). By using the NRI, hazards were broken into different categories then through HAZUS. For instance: Thunderstorms are broken out into Lightning and Strong Wind; and Extreme Heat is separated from Drought. Additionally, the risk rating for each hazard is calculated using parameters including a Social Vulnerability Index (SVI) — which takes 25 different vulnerability measures and compares them with social benefit factors.

The NRI uses FEMA's Value of Sustainable Life in calculating loss estimates. Hazards that do more damage to life as opposed to structural damage could have inflated values; however, Mr. Peters stated that the difference was not as large as they had anticipated. Another change is that hazards are broken out by Census Tract as opposed to by County. The data will still follow county boundaries, but will be broken out by Census Tracts within each county. For the new hazards – Radon, Invasive Species, Pandemic, Climate Change – the consultant had to rely on feedback from localities to some degree for assessing risk due to lack of available data.

Questions from the group included:

- What is the time period for the tornado analysis?
 - o The time period was 1986-2019.
- Is there a way to show trends?
 - o The consultant will look into it.
- Why didn't hurricanes make the final list of hazards that were assessed?
 - o In the final hazard ratings, hurricanes/tropical storms and strong winds/thunderstorms were rated as a moderate risk. Winter weather and drought received the highest ratings. In many instances, hurricanes weaken to tropical storms once they reach our region. The terminology may need to be tweaked in the assessment.
- Are there any detractors to using the SVI to assess/rate risk from each hazard, given that Census Tracts in rural areas are larger than in more urban areas?
 - The SVI is based on rates (per 100,000). The hope is that even with some Census Tracts more densely populated, this will provide more of an "apples-to-apples" comparison.
- Is there a way to look at the risk geographically as well?
 - The final risk index score should take all of those factors into account.

DISCUSSION OF NEXT STEPS, ADJOURNMENT

Mr. Fortune went over what the next steps will be. He asked that everybody look over the materials presented and let him or the team from The Berkley Group know by May 16 of anything that needs to be changed.

Mr. Fortune stated that CRC staff are working to update Sections 1 (Introduction), 2 (Planning Process), 3 (Regional Profile) and 7 (Capability Assessment). He advised that those sections will be sent out to the Project Management Team for review once those are ready.

Regional Emergency Planning for Election Security

The Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) was awarded two SHSP grants in 2020 to fund emergency planning activities. The first grant funded multiple planning activities: development of a Regional Resource Inventory, GIS mapping assistance for localities, coordinating and facilitating a training class for managing volunteers, development of a Regional Continuity of Operations Plan, and creation of a Regional PPE Stockpile Plan. This grant has been completed. The second grant is to assist local registrars with election security improvements as identified in Virginia House Bill (HB) 2178.

Approval of Minutes of September 23, 2022 Council Meeting:

Mr. Walker moved and Mr. Hankins seconded to approve the minutes as presented. Motion carried.

Treasurer's Report:

September/October: Mr. Miles gave the report and stated that he reviewed the financial report and found everything to be in order. Mr. Miles moved and Mr. Hankins seconded to approve the Treasurer's Report as presented. Motion carried.

Report of Officers, Committees & Executive Director:

Chairman's Report: There was none.

Executive Director Monthly Activities Report: Ms. Foster stated that a report was included in the Council packet. She stated that she attended the virtual EDA Longwood SEED Innovation Grant Kick-off meeting with the EDA representative and Longwood University Representatives. She also attended the Regional Managers meeting in Appomattox with County Administrators from around the region. She gave a presentation at this meeting providing information about the GO Virginia grant funding for the creation of the REDO. She attended virtual meetings with the Tobacco Commission staff to review potential project ideas including tourism funded activities. The CRC staff is currently working on one application to fund a connector trail in Cumberland. The CRC is also partnering with the SPDC and WPPDC to submit a regional application to the Tobacco Commission to fund a Tourism Marketing Study to create branding to market the region. Ms. Foster also attended the 2022 Governor's Summit on Rural Prosperity. She stated this Summit was very informative on providing information about issues in rural communities. Ms. Foster stated that she plans to drop off documents to the Auditor today and she is expecting to be able to report on the Audit at the next Council meeting. Mr. Hankins commended the

staff for their efforts regarding the current cash balance. Ms. Foster stated that the Council will need to review the cash balance return to localities considering the amount of the current cash balance.

Scoping the Future - Discussion of Innovative/Regional Ideas: There was no discussion on this.

Old Business:

Staff Monthly Project Reports:

Update on Regional Emergency Planning Activities: Mr. Fortune stated that a report was included in the Council packet. The consultant procured by the CRC is working with local registrars on deliverables per the election security grant, and their work is expected to be completed by January 2023. The grant will be closed out by June 2023.

Update on Watershed Implementation Plan (WIP) Phase III: Ms. Tillman stated that a report was included in the Council packet. She stated that the CRC partnered with the Amelia's Virginia Extension office to host a Rain Barrel workshop at the James L. Hamner Public Library in Amelia Court House. In this event, participants were able to decorate rain barrels and participate in other educational activities. The CRC is planning on continuing rain barrel workshops in the future. Mr. Jones asked Ms. Tillman about the number of participants. Ms. Tillman stated that seven kids attended the workshop. Ms. Foster added that registration was limited to only ten families. Ms. Jones added that more families registered for the event that did not attend.

Update on Prince Edward County Access Road Project: Ms. Foster stated that a report was included in the Council packet. J.R. Caskey, Inc. of Oilville, Virginia has executed a contract for construction. Work is expected to start in the Spring of 2023 due to the anticipated winter season. The construction is expected to be completed by August 2023.

Update on Nottoway County Comprehensive Plan Update: Mr. Fortune stated that a report was included in the Council packet. The Planning Commission has cancelled the October work session and full Planning Commission meeting. Instead, the CRC staff will meet with Nottoway County staff on October 28th to finalize the DRAFT plan and to discuss the next steps. Mr. Fortune is expecting to meet with the Planning Commission in November to finalize the Plan. By December, the Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors are expected to have a joint work meeting with the hopes of holding a joint public hearing in January.

Update on Charlotte County Comprehensive Plan Update: Mr. Fortune stated that a report was included in the Council packet. The Planning Commission had a Work Session on September 25th during which it reviewed draft Section II (Community Profile), and draft Section III (Inventory and Analysis: Community Resources) of the Plan. The group asked for some changes, which CRC staff are working on making. The next Work Session on the Plan is set for October 25, where the committee will review the changes to draft Section II and draft Section III.

Update on CRC Affordable Workforce Housing Development Program: Ms. Jones stated that a report was included in the Council packet. The three housing partners selected by the CRC are in various stages of development for their projects. Piedmont Habitat for Humanity finished clearing the lots and installing sediment and erosion control for the four homes on Andrew Street in Farmville. The estimated completion date is January 31, 2023. Smyth Properties awarded the bid for demolition to Special Renovations and is estimated to begin work on October 17th. The Town of Blackstone and

Southside Outreach are currently working with housing applicants and HUD certified housing counselors to prequalify applicants for mortgages.

Update on GO Virginia Region 3 Entrepreneurship and Innovation Implementation: Ms. Foster stated that a report was included in the Council packet. She stated that the CRC continues to track the expenses versus match for the applicant. Over the past month, the CRC has been in meetings with SPDC to review the reimbursement requirements moving forward. The grant is expected to be completed by the end of this year.

Update on Kenbridge and Charlotte County Emergency Supplemental Historic Preservation (EHSP) Fund Projects: Ms. Jones stated that a report was included in the Council packet. The CRC is assisting the Town of Kenbridge and Charlotte County with grant-funded projects through the Department of Historic Resources to make repairs to historic structures that were damaged by Hurricane/Tropical Storm Michael. She stated that this meeting is a rare because it is within one of our project areas. The contractors are currently power washing the Town Hall with hopes to begin painting later this week. The Town of Kenbridge is paying out of pocket to power wash the building per the contractor's request. The contractor stated the paint would stick better to the exterior surface if it was clean. Mr. Matthews offered a tour of the building after the meeting. Mr. Jones asked Mr. Matthews if this building was damaged by a storm. Mr. Matthews explained to Mr. Jones the hurricane event that transpired and the resulting damage that occurred. Ms. Foster reminded everyone that this funding was exclusive to Hurricane Michael because of the extensive damage the hurricane caused. Mr. Jones asked if the grant covered one hundred percent of the repair costs. Mr. Matthews stated that the grant did cover all costs with the defined scope of work. There are additional costs that have resulted due to the damage that the Town would have to incur if the costs exceed the allocated funds. Charlotte County is undertaking mitigation measures to address moisture issues at the County Courthouse Complex. Ms. Jones stated that the contractors have completed the gutter work and are expected to begin the excavating work at the end of October. The CRC has filed for a one-year extension with DHR due to the addition of plaster repairs added to the project and the backlog of HVAC parts to complete the HVAC work.

Update on VATI Grant for Cumberland, Lunenburg and Prince Edward: Mr. Fortune stated that a report was included in the Council packet. The CRC was awarded a grant by DHCD through the Virginia Telecommunication Initiative (VATI) program to provide funding to Kinex Telecom to complete a fiber buildout in part of Cumberland County, all of Prince Edward County, and part of Lunenburg County. Kinex has started work in Prince Edward County and is working with VDOT to work around the guardrail on US 460. Kinex and their contractor has been having issues with the firm that was contracted to locate existing utility lines. Kinex is still working to address this issue. Mr. Emert stated that he is surprised that Kinex was not aware that they would have to work with VDOT to address any issues with guardrails.

Update on Regional Reassessment RFP: Ms. Jones stated that a report was included in the Council packet. The CRC assisted eight counties, all of the counties in the CRC Region plus Appomattox County, with the preparation and advertisement of a Request for Proposals (RFP) for real estate reassessment services. She stated that the eight counties have interviewed and selected two firms – Wampler Eanes and Pearson Appraisal, to be on a 'on call' list for reassessment services. Each county will be able to contact their firm of choice at their time of reassessment. The CRC contacted these firms to inform them of this.

Update on Drakes Branch SLFRF Projects: Ms. Foster stated that the CRC assisted the Town of Drakes Branch in developing a request for cost estimates that was submitted to one of the listed firms in the CRC On-Call Consultant Program to provide estimated costs in replacing water lines and water

meters throughout the town. Due to the high cost estimate the Town received, the Town and CRC representatives have selected to set up a meeting with the firm to discuss next steps in reducing the scope of the project to meet the goals of the Town without exceeding the Town's budget for this project.

Update on CRC Enhanced Capacity Building Grant: Ms. Foster stated that the CRC participated in a Contract Negotiation Meeting with DHCD for the awarded CRC GO Virginia Grant. Work on this study will begin in November with completion date of November 2023.

Update on Extension of CRC Lease thru June 2023: Ms. Foster stated that she has been in touch the landlord and the contract to extend the CRC's lease thru June 2023 has been signed by both parties.

Council Member Comments: Mr. Hankins stated that in the city of Los Angeles, California there were some heated arguments centered around redistricting. Mr. Hankins commended Ms. Foster and CRC staff on their redistricting efforts emphasizing on how simple they made the process.

New Business:

Staff Reports

CRC Hazard Mitigation Plan Update – Public Input Session: Mr. Fortune provided a media presentation informing attendees of the Plan's requirements and objectives. This Public Input Session is intended to help satisfy FEMA's public participation requests. Mr. Fortune opened the floor for questions. There were no questions.

Update on Grant Writing: Mr. Fortune stated a copy of the grant writing report was included in the Council packet. Mr. Fortune congratulated the Town of Kenbridge on being awarded \$49,800 in Virginia Economic Development Partnership (VEDP) Virginia Brownfield Assistance Fund (VBAF) grant funding for lead/asbestos remediation and removal of an underground storage tank at vacant commercial property. The Town also received funding from the Virginia Outdoor Foundation (VOF) Preservation Trust Fund (PTF) to fund the construction of a connector trail in the town park. The Town also awarded \$1,997.50 from Virginia Department of Forestry's (VDOF) Trees for Clean Water Grant to purchase trees as a buffer between the Town's soccer field and waste water treatment plant. Mr. Fortune congratulated Piedmont Regional Jail on being awarded \$50,000 in grant funds from the USDA Rural Development fund to assist with the purchase of vehicles.

The CRC assisted Lunenburg County with an application to the Virginia Economic Development Partnership for a Virginia Brownfields Assistance Fund (VBAF) grant for lead/asbestos remediation and removal at a commercial property in Victoria that is slated for redevelopment. Mr. Fortune stated that CRC staff assisted and submitted three grant applications through the Department of Housing and Community Development's Industrial Revitalization Fund program: The Town of Blackstone, for funding to rehab/renovate the Harris Memorial Armory Center for use as a multi-use facility including job training programs by Virginia State University and Transition Solutions Enterprises, a local non-profit; the Town of Kenbridge, for funding to rehab/renovate a former tobacco warehouse/ manufacturing facility for re-use as a manufacturing facility for recyclable food containers; and the Town of Farmville, for funding to rehab/renovate the Mary E. Branch Community Center for use as a multi-use facility. The applications were due by August 19.

The CRC assisted the Nottoway County Emergency Squad with submitting an application for RSAF funds to purchase training equipment to train its members. The application was due on September 15th.

The CRC is assisting the Town of Blackstone in submitting an application to the Tobacco Commission's Southern Virginia Program for construction on the Armory. The CRC is also assisting Cumberland County with an application for the Cumberland Court House Village Connector Trail. The CRC is partnering with West Piedmont Planning District Commission and Southside Planning District Commission on a regional application for funds to develop a Regional Tourism Study.

The CRC submitted and is awaiting word on two State Homeland Security grant applications. The CRC assisted the Town of Farmville on submitting an application to purchase portable barricades. The CRC also submitted an application to undertake community outreach activities related to emergency preparedness.

Council Member Comments: Mr. Emert lead a discussion regarding the current cash balance policy. Ms. Foster recommended the board review the cash balance policy after the audit is presented.

Mr. Jones asked Ms. Foster what funds are supporting the current operating budget. Ms. Foster stated that the operating budget comes from annual contracts through the state of Virginia, DEQ & VDOT, membership dues, and grant administration contracts.

Commonwealth Intergovernmental Review Process (CIRP): There were none.

Other Business: There were none.

Adjournment, Next Meeting: The meeting adjourned at 10:34 a.m. The next meeting was set for Wednesday, November 16th, at the Prince Edward Court House in Farmville, Virginia.








This map shows wildfire frequency in the area, along with known wildfire incidents, based on VDOF data.


The Virginia Department of Forestry (VDOF) developed the Forestland Conservation Value model to identify the highest priority forestland for conservation in Virginia. Per VDOF, the intent of this model is to "maximize the efficiency of limited resources by focusing conservation efforts on the highest quality, most productive, and most vulnerable forestland statewide." The model has been updated multiple times, most recently in 2020, and uses six components/data input layers to prioritize the highest value forestlands for conservation.



Riverine flooding, per FEMA - when streams and rivers exceed the capacity of their natural or constructed channels to accommodate water flow and water overflows the banks, spilling out into adjacent low-lying, dry land.

The National Risk Index (NRI) is an online dataset used to determine risk from hazards by County and by Census Tract. The NRI calculates Expected Annual Loss using an equation that includes exposure, annualized frequency, and historic loss ratio. The NRI assesses risk from 18 different hazards; HAZUS focused on 4.

Revised Mapping – cont.



One of the hazards that was added for this plan update is Radon. This map shows potential exposures to radon by County. This map, courtesy of the Virginia Department of Health, identifies radon zones based on EPA data including radon test results, existing knowledge of surface geological features/layers and measurements of background radiation.

Each locality was asked to self-asses their own capabilities to implement mitigation activities. Each locality conducted this assessment based on their Planning and Regulatory Capability, Administrative and Technical Capability, Fiscal Capability, and Political Capability to get an overall capability score. Capabilities were scored Low, Medium, or High.

Samples of Mitigation Actions in the Plan

- Amelia County Construct waterproof barriers at the wastewater treatment plant to prevent future flood damages if the future relocation plan does not eliminate the hazard soon enough
- Buckingham County Purchase generators for critical facilities and shelters (for emergency power)
- Charlotte County Implement community early warning systems on school campuses, designed to notify school staff, students, and others on school grounds during weather related emergencies
- Cumberland County Review all permits for new development and substantial improvements for compliance with the County's ordinances as they relate to flood areas
- Lunenburg County Designate and prepare safety shelter in several locations in the county
- Nottoway County Prohibit or limit floodplain development through regulatory and/or incentive-based measures
- Prince Edward County Acquisition and removal of remaining homes in floodplain areas of the County
- Farmville Construction of salt bin for storing salt for winter storms

Highlights of Mitigation Actions from Other Towns:

- Drakes Branch Acquisition and demolition/removal of buildings in the floodplain (current project using HMGP funds from FEMA
- Victoria Purchase and installation of an emergency generator for sewer pump station (recently completed project using PDM/BRIC funds from FEMA)

Process (cont.)

- Meetings/Workshops:
 - May 4, 2021 (kick-off meeting with Project Management Team and regional stakeholders)
 - January 18, 2022 (HIRA consultation meeting between consultant, Project Management Team, and regional stakeholders)
 - May 9, 2022 (HIRA workshop open to the public)
 - October 19, 2022 (public input session)
- Project Management Team also consulted with CRC staff via phone, e-mail.

 - -A citizen survey was made available for public input.
 - -The public was invited to the May 9, 2022 virtual HIRA meeting.
